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Pastor's Ponderings

Next door to my house is a house that for years was a group home run by STAR. Its residents were developmentally disabled adults. I remember when I first began visiting there - it is 15 years ago, now. One of the residents, Michael MacDonald, had begun attending our church and wanted to join, so I went over every week to teach him the basics of the Christian faith and ready him for communicant membership. Jack Kleis, who was an Elder at the time, joined me. Michael couldn't read, so I would bring pictures which helped to illustrate what I was teaching. I especially remember the week we focused on the first chapters of Genesis, which proclaim that God is our creator. After the lesson, Sara, the young woman who ran the home that day, guestioned Michael about what he had learned. "Who made the world, Michael?" she asked. He thought about it and then responded, "Jesus did!" "That's great, Michael!" she said, and then asked, "Who made lions?" Again, he thought about it and then responded, "Jesus did!" "Very good, Michael," I said, and then asked, "Michael, who made Sara's new baby?" (She and her husband, Rob, had a 5-month old baby.) Michael thought about my question and then said, "Rob!" We all burst into laughter. None of us were expecting that answer! And, you know, Michael was right - and very insightful!

Rob and Sara did make their baby – along with God. Every baby is made by a man and a woman; every baby except one. The prophet Isaiah, over 700 years before Jesus was born, prophesied: "Behold, the virgin will conceive and bear a son, and will call him Immanuel" – which means, God with us. "How can this be, since I do not know a man?" asked Mary when the angel Gabriel appeared to her and told her that she, a virgin, would bear the Savior. Gabriel responded, "The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Highest will overshadow you; therefore, also, that Holy One who is to be born will be called the Son of God."

Sadly, there are many in our day who say that this did not happen. Many leading theologians and Bible scholars – you see them quoted on TV programs and in magazines often this time of year – believe only what their experience tells them must be so. The Scripture that recounts Mary's conception and birth must be the repeating of a fable, the intentional restating and expanding of the story to make Jesus appear greater, they say. Michael MacDonald was far smarter than the wisest theologian who proclaims this. He listened to what I taught and believed what God said because God said it. A virgin conceives? The number of chromosomes in her ovum doubles and changes on its own? Yes, if God says so; and He does.

Does this really matter? Is this story of Mary's miraculous conception of Jesus (which only occurs in a few verses in Luke) all that big a deal? Yes! God says it is and tells us of it, and that should be enough. But, it is also a big deal because from this we learn that Jesus is like us - fully human, conceived of a woman, spending 9 months growing and developing within her, and being born like us - and yet is unlike us. He is conceived without sin, for His father is God the Holy Spirit Himself. As God breathed into the dirt He had formed into a man and brought Adam to life as His son, so the Holy Spirit, the breath of God, breathed upon Mary and brought forth His Son into life among us. Jesus is the new Adam, and in Him creation begins all over again! Baptized into Him and believing in Him, we, too, are given a new beginning. The apostle John says in His Gospel, "He came to his own, and His own people did not receive Him. But to all who did receive Him, who believed in His name, He gave the right to become children of God, who were born, not of blood nor of the will of the flesh nor of the will of man, but of God." (John 1:11-13) And St. Paul says in 2 Cor. 5, "If anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; the old has gone, the new has come!" This is what Christmas, the celebration of the Father's gift of His Son to us, is all about.

Who made you? Because Jesus was conceived and born of a virgin for us, and died and rose for us, we can all answer: "Jesus did!"

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CONFIRMATION ESSAY

This month's essay is from Bryce Saladyga, and is on the Ten Commandments.

We find the Ten Commandments in two different places in the Bible. They are in both Exodus (chapter 20, verses 2- 17) and in Deuteronomy (chapter 5-verses 2-21).

The Ten Commandments were given to Moses by God himself on Mount Sinai. God picked Moses to go back to Egypt to demand that the Israelites be freed from slavery. Moses was leading and living with the Israelites near Mount Sinai teaching them God's ways. Moses went up Mount Sinai and received the Ten Commandments through God's own voice and also, they were written on two stone tablets. They weren't written on the stones by Moses but they were written by God himself.

God told his people something before he gave Moses the Ten Commandments. He said "I am the Lord thy God, which have brought thee out of the land of Egypt and out of the house of bondage". This is important because God is telling his people that he is their real leader and that HE cares for them - HE saved them - HE is the person that they need to look to and follow. By doing that, they will be safe and free.

But why did God give them and us the Ten Commandments? God gave his people the Ten Commandments so that they would know what was expected of them and how they were supposed to live their lives. What was important to him and in life, like at home or school. There are instructions and rules to give to us so we know what our expectations are.

God gave us all Ten Commandments or rules so we can understand what is expected of us. But not all of The Commandments are equally important. There are two that are more important than the others and one most important of all. The most important commandment is the first one: I am the Lord your God - you shall have no other gods before me. That you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the most important thing to remember. That HE is the most important and that all things are centered around God.

With the Commandments we know what is expected of us. But just like the rules at home or the rules at school, can we follow all the rules all of the time? Can we actually follow the Commandments? Unfortunately, no. Nobody except Jesus himself was perfect. God wants us to keep his Commandments just like Jesus did, but no matter how hard we try, we cannot keep the Ten Commandments. We are not perfect, in fact none of us are. Sin and death entered the world in the very beginning of the Bible when Adam and Eve didn't follow their original rule of not eating from the Tree of Life. Just like that, we all sin and fall short of the rules we were given to follow. We need to pray and ask for forgiveness all the time. We will never be perfect but thankfully we have forgiveness and unending love through Jesus.

The last question that Pastor asked me was, "Do the Ten Commandments save us or make us God's children?" We talked about this question at home. I think the answer is neither. The Ten Commandments were given so that the people understood how we are supposed to live our lives. Knowing that none of us can really follow the Commandments, they can't be what saves us. If the Commandments were the thing that saves us then none of us would be saved – which is not true. Do they make us God's children? Not really. But they are the rules given to us. At home I am my mom's and dad's child whether I follow the rules they give me or not. Nothing I can do will change this. I am also a child of God whether I follow the Ten Commandments or not. God sent his Son to save the world so that anyone who believes in him will have eternal life. We are supposed to live good lives according to the rules and the Ten Commandments. But they don't save me or make me God's child. I am saved by grace alone through faith in our Lord and Jesus Christ and his death on the cross.
