I've often wondered about Jesus' disciples when He ascended into heaven. Luke tells us that after He ascended and was parted from them, *"they worshiped him and returned to Jerusalem with great joy, and were continually in the temple blessing God."* I wonder how they could have been filled with great joy. Their Savior had left them!

Now, my departure is not at all like Christ's. Not even close! And, you will see me now and then. Eventually, I'll be here – God willing – to install your new pastor! 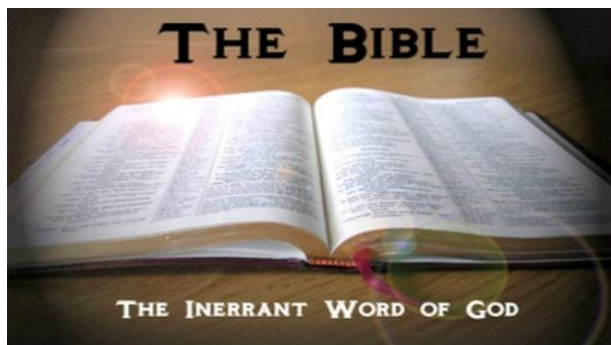

CONFIRMATION ESSAY

On Sunday, May 29, Kate Petrie was confirmed. During the Bible study hour before the Service she read an essay she had written on Ex. 15:2, her favorite Bible verse. Following is her essay.

Having reached the end of my confirmation studies in the Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod, I am ready and eager to confirm my baptism and take personal ownership for my faith. I am a Christian, and this is a big part of who I am. Jesus is caring and compassionate, and I always try to display those attributes as well. I love helping others in big and small ways. I volunteer as a Where Everyone Belongs (or WEB) Mentor at school and for American Heart Association events with my hockey team. I also enjoy smiling at someone when they walk by or boosting their confidence when they seem down. I try to live out my Christian faith and love others on a daily basis, just as Jesus would.

After completing the first year of my studies at Our Savior Lutheran in Excelsior, Minnesota, Pastor Beinke and I met weekly for the last several months to discuss the Bible and any other topics that were on my mind. I am thankful for Pastor Beinke. He is kind and wise and always has time for me. While studying with him and exploring the many stories, prayers, and songs that make up the Bible, I came across several verses that I found meaningful, but Exodus 15:2 was my favorite verse by far because of its perfect description of my personal relationship with God. It reads, *“The Lord is my strength and my song, and he has become my salvation.”*

When reading Exodus 14, which comes just before this verse, I witnessed many connections to baptism through the parting of the Red Sea. Baptism is a person's passage into a life with God. As the water washes over their heads, they have been forgiven of all their sins, and they have been reborn. While the people of Israel traveled through the Red Sea on dry ground, they were walking into a new life in God, and behind them they saw all of the evil, darkness, and sins washed away in the form of the Egyptians. As the Israelites are rejoicing for what God has done for them, they sing the words that have grown so meaningful to me: *“The Lord is my strength and my song, and he has become my salvation!”*

God has always given me strength in my life. In 2019, my family moved from Minnesota to Connecticut, and this took a lot of strength to adjust. I was starting sixth grade, and being the new kid was going to be hard. I worried that it would be difficult to meet new people, because everyone else had been in school together for years. I knew that my attitude would be important, and this mindset allowed me to approach the school year with confidence and to make new friends. Another aspect of my life for which I am thankful is hockey, and strength plays a big role in this sport. Hockey has brought many joyful moments into my life, but it has also involved disappointment and challenge. Strength takes many forms. It is perseverance, courage, and determination, and these attributes have helped me to be successful. Strength is essential in all aspects of life. It takes strength to do well in school and to earn good grades. Strength is fundamental in building relationships with others and in maintaining a deep connection with God. Faith, itself, takes strength and commitment, and I find my strength in the Lord. Going forward in life, God will always be my strength and my rock both in good times and in bad.

God is my song, and I rejoice in him for all the blessings he has given me. I am thankful for my warm home, loving family, and supportive friends. I also do my best to reflect God's goodness by caring for others. I love to make people happy by giving a hug or just a friendly “hello.” The idea of treating others as you want to be treated has helped to shape my life. I show compassion to others, because God has shown compassion to me. I look forward to Sundays when we can gather here in church and sing our praises to the Lord. As we rejoice in him together, I feel so thankful that I am in this community and that I was raised on a path with God and to know Jesus Christ as my Lord and Savior.

There are many verses in the Bible that encourage us to sing praise to the Lord for the gift of salvation, but Psalm 98 has some of the greatest similarities to Exodus 15:2. It reads:

Oh sing to the Lord a new song, for he has done marvelous things! His right hand and his holy arm have worked salvation for him. The Lord has made known his salvation; he has revealed his righteousness in the sight of the nations. He has remembered his

steadfast love and faithfulness to the house of Israel. All the ends of the earth have seen the salvation of our God. Make a joyful noise to the Lord, all the earth; break forth into joyous song and sing praises! Sing praises to the Lord with the lyre, with the lyre and the sound of melody! With trumpets and the sound of the horn make a joyful noise before the King, the Lord! Let the sea roar, and all that fills it; the world and those who dwell in it! Let the rivers clap their hands; let the hills sing for joy together before the Lord, for he comes to judge the earth.

I love the imagery of the earth and the sea glorifying God with song! Jesus is our salvation, and he is worthy of our praise.

Finally, but most importantly, God is my salvation through his great sacrifice and everything that he has done for me. Exodus 14:13-14 states:

Moses answered the people, Do not be afraid. Stand firm and you will see the deliverance the Lord will bring you today. The Egyptians you see today you will never see again. The Lord will fight for you; you need only to be still.

This excerpt displays how the Lord delivers us from our enemies and from sin. God will always be there for us both in times of trouble and in moments of great joy, and he will be present to save us from sin and fear. God does not just watch us live our lives. He is constantly with us and helping us. Countless times in the Old Testament, we see the Angel of the Lord coming down to earth, and this is God. We see him save people of various backgrounds and bring together the people who praise him. God was physically present, and we see him once again sacrificing for us when he sent his only son, Jesus, to die for our sins. God wants to help us in all aspects of our lives, and all we need to do is be still, listen, and praise him for he has done great things for us.

My faith has had a great influence on the person who I am today. The strength that I find in God has helped me to achieve success and to get through difficult times. My ability to find joy in God's Word helps me to appreciate what I have, to find the goodness in the world around me, and to share those blessings with others.

Dear Friend of the Mid-South District,

In the evening and early morning hours of December 10 and 11, 2021, devastating tornadoes struck numerous communities across Arkansas, Tennessee and Kentucky. As images of the unimaginable destruction and news of the staggering death toll emerged, hearts across the nation were saddened and moved to take action—hearts just like yours. In the wake of this terrible disaster, compassionate people like you answered the Mid-South District's call to help provide relief. The response to this call was so great that District Disaster Relief dollars are continuing to be disbursed through direct grants to storm victims today—six months after that evening of destruction. The following is a summary of that response, by the numbers:

- \$576,500 donated to the Disaster Relief Fund since December 12, 2021.
- 620 donors from across the nation responded to the call for relief
- 70 direct grants to victims provided to date
- Grant amounts have ranged from \$500 to \$10,000

To truly understand the impact of this generous response, look no further than the words of disaster victims who received direct grants from the Mid-South District and on-site recovery assistance from Lutheran Emergency Response Teams (LERT). I have shared examples of correspondence from both on the reverse side of this letter. These are just two of numerous notes of gratitude sent by recipients of Mid-South District aid.

Months after tornadoes carved a 250-mile path of destruction through Mid-South communities, news coverage and the eyes of the world have moved on. But thanks to the compassion and generosity of people like you, the countless victims of that terrible disaster need not feel forgotten. Thanks to you, they continue to have quick access to funds that can help them with immediate needs as they work to rebuild their homes and lives.

It is a humbling honor to be able to serve as the hands and feet of Christ for people who have suffered such unimaginable loss and grief through unexpected tragedy. Yet we know that our service is strengthened through the prayers and partnership of people like you. Know that your support of the Mid-South District's Disaster Relief Fund continues to impact victims of the December tornadoes still today—and that we are forever grateful for your kindness and generosity.

But it is the generosity of fellow Lutherans that are the hands of God at work with this tremendous recovery project.

To all who showed support for us and our community: whether it was monetary donations, physically helping with cleanup and recovery operations or keeping us lifted up in prayers, we are truly humbled and grateful.

Thank you seems so inadequate when our hearts are so full of gratitude.

May the Lord continue to bless the Missouri Synod and the believers who truly show Christian love.
